On November 7, we celebrated the life and work of Phyllis Hotch, who served on the SOMOS Board of Directors for over 20 years and as president for 14. She left an enduring literary legacy that will be valued for generations.

SOMOS is only able to continue meeting its mission and serving readers and writers near and far through the support and generosity of our membership. On behalf of the Board, I thank you all.

2021 SOMOS April National Poetry Month Celebration Curator's Report

This year's National Poetry Month events were again held primarily online via Zoom due to the coronavirus pandemic. We held eight public events including a featured SOMOS Writers Showcase reading and workshop by nationally-recognized poet Ada Limón. The Typewriter Poetry event was the only live event and was held on the SOMOS front porch with Covid-19 protocols in place. The grand finale of the month was the SOMOS Young Writers Night which was hosted by 9th grader Ilana Weisfeld with music by internationally-acclaimed flamenco artist and Embudo native, Vicente Griego.

Total Poetry Month attendance was 201. The number of audience members at an individual event is presented in parentheses following that event in the schedule below. All events were free to the public except for Ada Limón's reading and workshop; one young writer received a full scholarship from SOMOS to attend Ada Limón's reading and workshop.

In addition to these public events, Curator Ariana Kramer volunteered in the Taos School of Integrated Arts (TISA) 3rd grade classroom with teacher Arthur Coleman to lead two poetry-focused lessons and host a classroom reading of the students' poems. The two lessons were held online, and the reading was held in-person at TISA with parents invited to attend.

2021 SOMOS Prose Month Curator's Report



Prose month began its fourth annual celebration with Writers Showcase award-winning writer, EJ Levy, who read from her debut novel, *The Cape Doctor*, and taught a workshop the following day on "Auto-Fiction: Writing from Life." Her previous publications include a short story collection, *Love in Theory*, and her anthology, *Tasting Life Twice: Literary Lesbian Fiction by New American Writers*.

Two readings had to be canceled: A playwriting night with three playwrights (Vivian Carroll, Helen Rynaski & Margaret Hansen) because it did not lend itself to a performance on Zoom; and a reading by James McGrath Morris on his latest biography, *Tony Hillerman: A Life*, due to last minute travel plans.

Three drop-in free writing sessions for NaNoWriMo month were facilitated by writer, teacher, and poet Johanna DeBiase on consecutive Tuesday evenings.

Prose month continued with two readings each weekend including John Biscello, Celinda Kaelin, Jim Kristofic, Alexander Shalom Joseph, Sean Murphy, Leanna Torres, Paul Wapner, Maria Dolores Gonzales, and Rose Padilla.

A second workshop was held on Saturday, 11/20/21, by Jan Smith as the third installment of her seven-part series, "Dynamic Dialogue & Subtext."

All readings were free with the exception of the two workshops. Attendance averaged between a low of eight to a group of forty; with most ranging from 20-30.

Young Writers Program (see separate report) – Young Writers night was held on Friday, 4/30/21, with guest musician and singer Vicente Griego; collaboration with Twirl and Taos Ballet in the fall '21 for the production of "Three Witches" (young writers wrote the story line accompanying the dance), ongoing biweekly young writers writing group held at TISA, guest writing instructors in the public schools

Taos Writers Conference (see separate report); attendance 72 – conference was once again online on Zoom

Storytelling Festival – a one day festival occurred on Saturday, 10/9/21, with a storytelling workshop with Cisco Guevara, a story swap facilitated by Sarah Malone and evening of Storytellers – Cisco Guevara, Sarah Malone, and David McDonnell; total attendance: 86

Poet Laureate – Poetry in Nature project and reception was held on Sunday, 10/17/21, with over 40 people attending the walk and reception following the viewing of the 15 installed poems throughout Taos

Open Mic – continued to meet once/month with a steady group of between 3-8 people

Workshops – 46 different workshops were held on Zoom, on poetry, fiction, nonfiction, historical writing, and memoir

Readings – 25 readings were held by writers and poets with an average attendance between 6-40

Rental space – Due to COVID precautions we had another year of no rental spaces for writing groups, arts organizations, etc.

Taos Poet Laureate project 2020-2021 POETRY IN NATURE

The year 2021, the second year of my Poetry in Nature Project as Taos' Poet Laureate, involved the purchasing of numerous epoxy and varnish products from Jamestown Distributors in order to install the selected 15 poems onto purchased and donated flagstone and plastered walls at the properties in Taos that generously and enthusiastically accepted the poems for permanent display. Jeff Spicer of SpicerDigital worked closely and patiently with me to print the poems, sometimes numerous times on inkjet fabric paper, the poems on fabric the most essential part of the installation process. The early spring was a period of trial and error because of a change in the epoxy formula from the distributor, with the eventual success over the late spring and summer of all 15 poems being installed using a layering process. Heartfelt appreciation for the full support of Jan Smith, Executive Director of SOMOS who held me and Poetry in Nature every step of the way!

It has been my humble honor to have held this community position for the last two years in Taos where I have been embraced as a poet for close to 40 years.

2021 Taos Storytelling Festival







Cisco Guevara, Sarah Malone, and David McDonnell

Since pandemic concerns continued to dominate this fall (10/9-10/10/21) SOMOS decided to hold the storytelling festival main event (on Saturday evening) outdoors in our back parking lot, with a set of chairs, a mic sound system, theater lighting and refreshments. A smaller group of people congregated indoors (13) for the storytelling workshop facilitated by Cisco Guevara, and a StorySwap (8) led by Sarah Malone.

A contest for amateur storytellers who could win cash prizes of \$500, \$250, or \$100, was advertised. Cisco Guevara, Sarah Malone, and David McDonnell (the three featured tellers) would judge the recorded entries. Only one applicant submitted a recording, and he was invited to tell his "tale" at the main event. Instead, Cisco, Sarah & David each told stories regaling us with indigenous stories, Irish stories, and stories from a Hispanic tradition on the theme of "Transformations." An audience of 65 were captivated by the stories in the brisk dusk of a fall evening.

Cisco drew his outrageously true stories from his Hispanic and Indian heritage, and from his dynamic experiences as a river guide over the last quarter century. Sarah Malone is a founding member of Storytellers of New Mexico and is a bilingual storyteller who has woven tales for children and adults for over 30 years. David McDonnell is an author and storyteller (seanchaí in the words of the Irish) with a passion for Irish and Irish American history.

2021 Taos Writers Conference, 7/23-7/25/21

This was the second year in a row that SOMOS presented the annual Writers Conference on Zoom due to the pandemic. By this time many of us were "zoom fatigued;" consequently enrollment for the conference was lower than hoped for with an attendee total of 72 compared to previous years ranging from 85-92. There was much less training needed to use the Zoom platform because by then a majority of the faculty and students were familiar with its logistics, including screen sharing, breakout rooms, mute, and video on/off. Similar to 2020 all faculty members were interviewed for 15 minutes prior to the conference so that attendees could meet them "virtually" and hear about the workshop in advance.

Only two of the 20 workshops were canceled due to low enrollment and average workshop size ranged from 6-14. Highlighted faculty included newcomers Frank X Walker, Jeremy Paden, Ari Honavar, Jasminne Mendez, Mary Oishi, Linda Addison, Levi Romero, David Meischen, Eddie Tafoya, Margaret Garcia, & Stephanie Han along with continuing faculty: Connie Josefs, Bob Arellano, Jenn Shapland, Juan Morales, Sean Murphy, Johanna DeBiase, Catherine Strisik, and Veronica Golos. The theme of the 2021 conference focused on unity through diversity culminating in a panel discussion of six writers & poets on Saturday evening sharing thoughts, ideas, and craft on "Writing about Race, Class, Culture & Gender." The panelists included Stephanie Han, Frank X Walker, David Meischen, Jenn Shapland & Mary Oishi with moderator, Juan Morales.

As in the past, five all-day intensives were offered on Friday from 10AM – 4PM; a keynote speaker (Luci Tapahonso) on Friday evening; five sessions on Saturday from 9-12PM; two lunch time roundtable discussions (preparing a poetry manuscript for publication & demystifying the traditional publishing industry); followed by five workshops from 2-5PM. On the Sunday, the last five workshops were presented from 9AM-12PM.

Instead of traditional book sales, authors and poets listed on Zoom "chat" where their books could be purchased and the corresponding website links.

A sample of the workshops offered included: Poetry Forms for All Writers; Writing the Imaginal; Identity and Voice: The Narrative of Group and Self, Transforming Scars to Art; and Harvesting History & Headlines.

Feedback forms were positive and hoped for a live conference in 2022!

Young Writers Program/Spring Semester 2021 and Fall Semester 2021





Another year of COVID necessitated a continuation of Zoom meetings for the young writers' groups and for mentor/mentee meetings as well as writers-in-the-schools. Due to generous funding from the Frost Foundation, workshop scholarships were given to seven young writers to attend a Lighthouse workshop (Writing Sci-Fi & Fantasy), A Teen Boot Camp, a workshop by poet Ada Limón, and complimentary admission to the weekend workshops of the Taos Writers Conference. An opportunity to attend the week-long Iowa Writers Youth Camp was offered but not able to be used by any of the young writers.

Throughout the spring and fall of 2021 the young writers group met every other week for one hour. During the spring semester 8 authors (Nora Carpenter, Bonnie Pipkin, Orion Cervio, Megan Bradley, Vicente Griego, Samantha Samoiel, Estelle Laure, & Bre Messerole) led writing salons either on Zoom or in the Taos public schools (some more than once). From January on concerted efforts were focused on assisting students to write and prepare a reading for the Annual Young Writers Night which was held on Zoom on April 30, 2021. Guest flamenco musician and singer, Vicente Griego, performed as a special guest as part of the evening's performance which included ten young writers reading their prose and/or poetry. There were 40 people in attendance, including friends, parents, and teachers.

Also, two young writers accepted the invitation from the Radio Show hosted by the TCA to read their poems on-line for National Poetry Month in April 2021.

In the fall of 2021, the twice a month young writers group began meeting after school at TISA (Thanks to sponsoring teacher, Sally Greywolf) with a range of attendance from 11-35 students on a twice a month basis. For the first three sessions facilitated by Estelle Laure, Young Writers Program Curator, the focus was on writing/editing the narrative to a dance collaboration with Taos Dance, "The Three Witches," which was aired on Zoom for Halloween. Due to a medical leave of absence Breanna Messerole substituted for Estelle Laure for the remaining writing groups from 10/13-12/15/21. Students explored several themes with writing prompts, including dialogue, character development, and black out poetry. The latter session was led by the 2021-22 student intern, Ilana Weisfeld, based upon prompts she received from her SOMOS mentor the previous year.

Plans for 2022 include more scholarships to workshops (by Camille Dungy, the Taos Writers Conference), continuation of the young writers' groups, an Annual Youth Writers Night at the end of April, and author/poet visits in the schools, as precautions allow. Efforts are being made to expand the diversity of both mentors/mentees by doing active outreach, direct invitations, and community relationship building.

2021 SOMOS Bookshop Report

As with just about all aspects of life, the Bookshop has been impacted by the **Covid** virus. We have kept operating and mid-year added back opening on Saturdays. Although the tourist season was pretty good, it most likely would have been stronger without the pandemic. A good side effect though was that there was/is much more display space for books because chairs were/are not set up for events. At times, sales varied widely from day-to-day for no apparent reason.

Good Volunteers kept appearing and disappearing due to moving, getting jobs or broken bones etc. We have a solid core of responsible regulars for which I am very grateful. They continue to be a critical component of the shop. My intention for 2022 is to update the Handbook for them and provide them with more training.

Donations quantities came in at normal levels of varying quality, as per usual. At times I have been invited to people's home to take whatever I can/want/need that they are offering from their shelves.

We are able to keep the **Free Book**s well stocked as people are digging deeper in their garages and bringing older and dirty books as well as duplicates. We have regular shoppers both at the Free Box and inside the Shop! A magazine exchange seems to have developed outside.

Two tall **bookshelves were donated** this year which allowed for a much better display (and sales) of the Kids/YA/Parenting/Educ/Ref sections.

These **New Section**s were added in 2021:

Black Studies, Pregnancy/Birth, Parenting, Teens, Mexico and Southwest have been separated.

The \$1 Special Sales were continued. The Sections on sale are chosen by amount of over-stock on hand. They are changed quarterly, with the Solstice and the Equinoxes.

For many years we have worked with Brodsky's to sell especially valuable books. Now that Rick has made his shop more of an online entity we have been able to do more business with him. It is mutually beneficial to us both.

Looking into the future the SOMOS Bookshop hopes to increase our local customer traffic and thus our sales.
